

Health Beat:

Pet Therapy

Pet therapy is described as a guided interaction between a person and a trained animal that can help someone recover from or cope with a health problem or mental disorder. The most common animals that are used in pet therapy are dogs and cats but other animals, such as guinea pigs or horses, that have met screening criteria can also be used. Some goals and benefits of pet therapy include increasing self-esteem, increasing verbal communication, developing social skills, increasing willingness to join in activities, improving symptoms of depression, decreasing isolation, reducing anxiety, and helping to learn empathic and nurturing skills.

At the Walsh Academy, pet therapy is a support that students can voluntarily engage in during the school day. Our current therapy dog is named Mags and comes to the school every Wednesday to visit with students. Mags, who's owner is Walsh Academy's Assistant Principal Ms. Heather Lischett, has been a certified therapy dog since June 2018. Ms. Heather thought that Mags would be a good candidate for

pet therapy after several successful visits to the school, prompting her to seek out the certification to have Mags become a pet therapy dog. Ms. Heather describes that generally to be a good candidate for pet therapy, a dog needs to be able to be calm around both people and other dogs, follow commands on the leash, be able to sit/lay/stay, and not become aggressive when someone touches their ears or paws.



Mags went through basic obedience training as a puppy and then did the therapy dog assessment later when she was four years old. In order to be a certified therapy dog, a dog must be at least two years old and go through an initial assessment that consists of three separate visits to public places. Mags completed hers at a Lowe's, a dog friendly store, and at two retirement homes where she visited with the elderly. Additionally, Ms. Heather had to pass a written test showing an understanding of the pet therapy handbook, a test that needs to be retaken annually to renew licensure. The school must also maintain the appropriate insurance to have a therapy dog in the building. Many students enjoy having access to seeing Mags every week!

Classroom Corner

As part of our CTE programming, Walsh Academy is currently outfitting a screen-printing classroom. Walsh Academy now has a 4 station, 6 screen Sabre Workhorse silk screen printer, drying station, and image printer. This new equipment and job site will be a great start for students to learn a new skill for their future and to potentially create a professional and profitable clothing screen printing business of their own.

What is Silk Screen Printing?


Screen printing, also referred to as silk screening, is a method of printing designs or graphics on a T-shirt or other fabric item. Screen printing uses thick inks that lay on top of the shirt rather than having the shirt soak them in.

How Does a Silk Screen-Printing Machine Work?

Screen printing is the process that involves transferring a stenciled design on a flat surface with ink, a mesh screen,



and a squeegee. Screen printing allows for students to apply designs onto various items other than just t-shirts. Although paper and fabric are the most typical surfaces that are used in screen printing, it is also possible to print onto metal, plastic, glass, and wood. This latest class will be a cost-effective method for production runs, as the setup costs are relatively low compared to other printing techniques. One of the most significant advantages of traditional screen printing is its durability. The ink used in screen printing is thicker and more substantial than the ink used in DTG printing. This results in designs that stand up well to repeated washing and wear, making screen printed garments ideal for items like team jerseys, work uniforms, and promotional merchandise.
