

- In world history they are studying ancient Rome in Mr. Justin's class.






What's Happening at Walsh? Guest Speaker – Author, Michael Menard

Jean Luc Godard wrote, "Sometimes reality is too complex. Stories give it form."

Walsh Academy was recently visited by author, Michael Menard. Menard is one of those people in society whose own life was complex and challenging, but his resilience gave him the ability to become the person he is today. Being the second oldest of 14 siblings and living in poverty with complex trauma, Menard was able to tell his story with the hidden message of hope in his latest book, "The Kite that Couldn't Fly". Menard visited each classroom here at Walsh Academy to highlight some excerpts from his book and get direct feedback from the students. He talked with the students to let them know that they are able to emerge victorious

from even the most difficult circumstances that life may give them. Each student was gifted with a signed copy of his book and these books will be read in class as part of a unit where students will be able to reflect on the stories and respond to Menard so that he may share in their own personal conquests of resiliency in a similar style. Walsh staff will then share the student stories with Michael in start of what we hope to be a continued partnership and learning community between Michael and Walsh.
